

 - Emergency Communication Team (ECT)





3 Steps:



Know your hazards



Make your plan



Build Your Kit

Basic personal preparedness

72 hours (ideally more)

- Emergency Kit
- Grab and Go bag



First aid kit, prescriptions and other personal items



Battery-powered or hand-crank radio



Battery-powered or hand-crank flashlight



Whistle



Emergency plan, copies of important documents and cash

Phone charger

and battery bank

Non-perishable food

for at least three days



Garbage bags, moist towelettes and plastic ties



Blanket, seasonal clothing and footwear



Water for at least three days; four litres per person per day
