Agenda topic	Discussion/action items
Welcome,     acknowledgement     and introductions	<ul> <li>Michelle began with an Indigenous land acknowledgement and noted the meeting's regrets.</li> <li>Michelle introduced herself and welcomed the new committee members.</li> <li>All committee members followed and introduced themselves.</li> </ul>
2. Port policing presentation and Q&A: w. Anita Gill	<ul> <li>Anita introduced herself, her role, and history with the VFPA.</li> <li>Anita explained the goals of her department and the port authority regarding port resiliency.</li> <li>Anita clarified the port authority's obligations, jurisdiction and mandate pertaining to port lands and its tenants who operate terminals.</li> <li>Committee members discussed different forms of terminal security.</li> <li>Anita explained the security infrastructure present on port lands and available to terminal operators.</li> <li>The presentation ended with a clarification of CBSA actions, authority, and collaboration with local police departments.</li> <li>The committee discussed the authority of local police forces on port terminals.</li> <li>Further discussions proceeded on how drugs enter Canada.</li> <li>Committee members expressed concerns that the Delta Police Department does not have the resources to assist the terminals in a meaningful way.</li> <li>Committee members learned more about how the federal government makes decisions about port policing policies.</li> <li>Committee members expressed interest in a presentation on how port safety policies are enforced and monitored on vessels.</li> <li>Mike Brotherston asked if the port authority or any terminal operators would formally respond to the report on port policing.</li> </ul>
3. Global Container Terminals (GCT) update: w. Marko Dekovic	<ul> <li>Marko gave the committee an overview of GCT's operations and the sale of its NY and NJ terminals.</li> <li>Marko stated the company is working to lower its emissions at their terminals.</li> <li>He also provided an update on the Deltaport berth 4 (DP4) project.</li> <li>New committee members requested information on why container volumes have dropped in 2023.</li> <li>Initiatives by GCT to lower carbon emissions were discussed and clarified.</li> <li>The committee asked about the potential environmental impact from a future terminal expansion.</li> </ul>
4. VFPA update: w. Jennifer Natland	<ul> <li>The VFPA update is available here.</li> <li>Jennifer informed the committee that Peter Zotta was appointed president and CEO of the Vancouver Fraser Port Authority.</li> <li>Jennifer discussed that the port authority is examining the feasibility of building a new cruise facility outside Burrard Inlet.</li> <li>Committee members stated their interest in seeing port volume data expand to encompass up to ten years instead of only year-to-year comparisons.</li> <li>Committee members asked about the dredging of Ladner harbour.</li> <li>Committee members shared community concerns about the harbour's feasibility in the absence of dredging and its negative impact on residents.</li> </ul>
5. Roundtable	<ul> <li>New committee members explained what drew them to PCLC and their backgrounds.</li> <li>Heather Lapper –Said farewell and thank you for four great years of community and learning.</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>Jill McKnight – Provided the committee with a Delta Chamber update.</li> <li>Chris Bevilacqua – Updated the committee on BC rail track maintenance.</li> <li>Mike Brotherston – Shared that the City of Delta approved a new financial plan and explained the reasoning and changes occurring.</li> <li>Greg Wirch – Said he had a great four years and is disappointed to leave but he was glad to have been involved.</li> <li>Randy Anderson-Fennel – Recommended a musical called "The Battle of Ballantyne Pier." It is a production about a historical incident that occurred on the Vancouver waterfront.</li> <li>Greg Andrew – Updated the committee on Westshore's potash project.</li> </ul>
6. Committee Business	<ul> <li>Michelle addressed her report and recapped the positives she heard during her year-end meetings.</li> <li>Michelle mentioned ideas for future presentations and organized a vote to prioritize certain topics of conversation.</li> <li>The top four topics selected were <ul> <li>an environmental presentation on the ports impact to migratory birds and wildlife,</li> <li>an update on new port developments such as new or expanding terminals,</li> <li>an update on potash development at Westshore and</li> <li>a presentation and breakdown on the port rankings released in summer 2023.</li> </ul> </li> <li>The new community representatives' orientation will be scheduled in early 2024.</li> </ul>
