	 A specific call out was included in the presentation regarding the port authority's advocacy of trade-enabling industrial lands and the work the 		
	organization is doing to identify opportunities to increase these lands.Updates were also provided regarding the port authority's work to		
	protect the habitats in which the organization operates, and specific mentions of environmental programs and efforts, including the Enhancing Cetacean Habitat and Observation (ECHO) program.

	 John Hawthorne from the Burrardview Community Association, asked about <u>Bill C-33</u> and how the proposed changes could affect port authority operations and Canada's trade. Peter X. provided information about how the proposed changes could allow the port authority to be more efficient in the organization's safety enforcement and compliance, as well as how it could potentially change the election process of the Chair of the Board of Directors (from elected to appointed). Jeff Otto, Member-at-Large, inquired about the recent Rolling Truck Age Program (RTAP) and the recently announced port authority decision to postpone the program for no less than nine months from the planned April 3, 2023 start date. Peter X. advised that although more than 85% of trucking companies had signed on, it was a contentious issue amongst the remaining 15%. This has informed the port authority's decision and the need to further reflect on the feedback received to ensure this measured approach can be implemented for long-term community and environmental health. John Hawthorne commented that Burrardview Community Association was supportive of the RTAP, and the neighbourhood hopes to see cleaner, quieter trucks in the near future. 		
3. Community/ organizational	Highlights: Committee members engaged in a round-table discussion of recent		
happenings	happenings:		
(SSCLC Members)	 Mike Lovecchio, CP Rail – CP will be seeing a rebrand due to the recent merger with Kansas City Southern and will now be referred to as Canadian Pacific Kansas City (CPKC). CP has also seen steady increases in grain cargo handling through the Port of Vancouver. 		
	 Angela Kirkham, DP World – DP World has completed the Centerm Expansion Project and South Shore Access Project, marking a huge milestone in enabling Canada's trade growth. 		
	 Jeff Otto, Member-at-Large – Inquired as to whether there was a safety operation training exercise in Burrard Inlet on March 2nd. Peter Idema informed there was a Seabus training drill. 		
	 Chris Robertson, City of Vancouver – The City's budget has been approved, which has helped to provide clarity on municipal priorities and guide day-to-day work. Reiterated he was glad to see the port authority raising the profile for the need for increased industrial lands. 		
	Carleen Thomas, Tsleil-Waututh Nation – No updates.		
	 John Hawthorne, Burrardview Community Association – advised that Nature Vancouver was conducting a volunteer work party to remove blackberry and other invasive plant species and plant native plants in New Brighton Park on March 4. Additionally, the Western Canada Marine Response Corp. (WCMRC) station near New Brighton Park is nearing completion. 		
	Peter Idema, Viterra – Experiencing a large crop year.		
	 Tyler Banick, CN Rail – Grain is top-of-mind at CN. The company just posted its best-ever February (2023) due to high cargo volumes and record crop year. Jeff O. asked whether the rail companies had received any of the recently announced provincial or federal flood 		

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	 protection funding. Both Tyler (CN) and Mike (CP) advised they have not. Andrea Kastanis, Strathcona Residents Association – Informed the 2nd Annual Celebrate Strathcona event will be on June 10, 2023, and invited committee members to attend. Also advised there is great concern within Strathcona regarding vacant properties and fire risk, especially after the recent January explosion and subsequent fire in Strathcona that destroyed 3 homes. 	
4. Port Authority Update (Peter Xotta)	An in-depth port authority update was not requested, as committee members were amenable to reviewing the previously provided Port Update on their own time. 5. December 2022 Satisfaction Survey Results Discussion <i>(Pam Ryan)</i>	 Pam R. informed the committee of the feedback received from the December 2022 Satisfaction Survey and asked for their insights and thoughts on opportunities for more two-way information sharing and engagement within the committee; a joint port liaison Committees meeting; identifying opportunities to expand replicable action items such as the Strathcona Area Air Quality Study; financial compensation for committee members. Pam informed the committee that committee service is a voluntary role and that the port authority would not provide financial compensation for membership. Committee members understood and agreed. Amanda Kastanis mentioned it would be helpful to be at the table as much as possible when important decision are being made (e.g. Rolling Truck Age Program (RTAP)). Also offered that any joint community 	

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	 liaison committee meetings should include areas of intersectionality of committees so as to keep a meeting like this relevant. Jeff Otto offered that a joint liaison committee meeting could be beneficial for committee members when it comes to overarching port authority messaging and programs (such as the ECHO program, RTAP program, etc.) and that the committee has been a useful tool to engage in two-way information sharing and dialogue. John Hawthorne inquired about Burrardview conducting a similar Air Quality Study as Strathcona. Pam informed that Strathcona was instrumental in driving this air quality study forward and that same commitment and dedication to the process would be required of Burrardview. Pam encouraged John to have Burrardivew reach out to the port authority to schedule a discussion with the port authority environmental team to explore this. Carleen Thomas signed off at 7:37 p.m. 		
6. SSCLC Strategic Plan Development 2023 Future Discussion (Pam Ryan)	 Pam shared that the SSCLC Terms of Reference state the dissolution of the committee in June 2023 and that there was a need to discuss the future of the committee. Pam asked for feedback from committee members as to what they envision the future of the committee looking like and whether they saw a need for the committee to continue. John Hawthorne asked that Mary-Helen, as a committee member, be engaged around this. Jeff Otto thought the committee was useful when it comes to project-specific needs and could imagine the committee meeting only when projects necessitate. Andrea Kastanis said she believes there is continued value due to a plethora of discussion items and that the port authority could explore engaging other "partners" in carrying the weight of meeting facilitation. Peter Xotta offered that he believed there has been solid collaboration between the port authority and community liaison committee groups and saw this as a primary function of the committee. Chance McKee mentioned the development of an all-liaison committee event in the Summer of 2023 and advised the port authority would be reaching out regarding that event and soliciting feedback from committee members regarding format.
