



Vancouver Fraser Port Authority: Mission and Vision



Vancouver Fraser Port Authority Governance



The 11 Governing Directors of the Vancouver Fraser Port Authority are appointed by four bodies:

- 1. Federal government appoints eight members, seven of which are recommended by port users
- 2. Province of British Columbia appoints one member for the province of British Columbia
- 3. Prairie provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba collectively appoint one member
- 4. 16 municipalities that border the port authority's jurisdiction collectively appoint one member

Roles and Responsibilities:

- Set direction and guide the port authority in fulfilling our mandate
- 2. Approve the corporate vision, mission, values, and goals
- 3. Set goals and objectives for corporate performance
- 4. Review performance against goals and objectives

Cargo Statistics: December 2022 Year-to-Date

Compared to 2021	-3%	-6%	6%	-23%	11%	8%	-3%	-24%*

- *Cruise volumes are compared to 2019 actuals.
- Increases over 2021 seen in coal (6%), potash (11%), sulphur (22%), petroleum products (6%), chemicals (9%) and foreign breakbulk (8%).
- Declines in autos (-6%), grain (-23%), and container TEUs (-3%).

South Shore Port Authority-Led Project Highlights

Port Authority-Led Projects:

- Centerm Expansion and South Shore Access Re-Alignment Projects
 - The Centerm Expansion Project and South Shore Access Project were built to help meet Canada's growing trade demand for goods shipped in containers. The projects were began in June 2019, and project completion was announced in February 2023.
- Commissioner Street Road and Rail Realignment Project
 - Construction of the roadworks began in March 2021 and achieved completion in August 2022. The project included removal of the old Columbia Containers grain elevator, construction of a retaining wall, and realignment of Commissioner Street near Columbia Containers.



South Shore Tenant-Led Project Highlights

Tenant-Led Projects:

Alliance Grain Terminal Limited | Shipping Gallery Replacement Project

 Completed 2018. The shipping gallery replacement project included decommissioning and removing the current shipping gallery and replacing it with a new rail-mounted shiploader.

Western Canada Marine Response Corporation | Oil Spill Emergency Response Base

Substantially completed Quarter 3 of 2022; Completion expected end of March 2023. Western
Canada Marine Response Corporation constructed an oil spill emergency response base in Burrard Inlet.
This base is part of a larger expansion planned to meet enhanced response requirements associated with
the Trans Mountain Expansion Project.

Viterra Pacific Elevators | Shipping Upgrade Project

Completed October 2016. Viterra completed a ship loading system upgrade at its existing Pacific Terminal.
The new ship loading system was constructed at an existing dock facility located on the Lapointe Pier side
of the facility.

· Columbia Containers | Partial Bight Infill


• Completed June 2020. Columbia Containers widened an internal corridor to facilitate more efficient internal circulation; to stop utilizing Commissioner Street for internal operations; and to better service their new Transloading Facility and Silos project by infilling the foreshore northward by approximately 18m.

Canadian Pacific Railway | Cascadia West Rail Extension


Completed March 2021. The project involves the connection of the existing L29 and K10 rail tracks and
includes the realignment and installation of new rail, of which approximately 30 metres is within the
Vancouver Fraser Port Authority's jurisdiction.




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Strengthening Road and Rail Gateway Infrastructure




Port Authority-Led Gateway Projects





Building Container Terminal Capacity




Port Authority-Led Container Terminal Projects





Streamlining Supply Chain Efficiency










Strathcona Air Quality Study



The Strathcona Area Air Quality Study is a two-year study (Spring 2022 – Spring 2024) that will measure and assess air quality in Strathcona and identify potential opportunities for improvement.

Study Scope and Objectives

- Increase awareness and knowledge of local air quality
- Identify appropriate locations for air quality monitors based on community input and the advice of technical experts
- Identify, characterize, and assess the impact of air pollution sources, particularly those associated with port activities and terminal expansion
- Identify potential opportunities to improve air quality

What Pollutants Will be Measured:

- Nitrogen dioxide (NO2)
- Sulphur oxides (SO2)
- Particulate matter (PM)

About the ECHO Program




A first-of-its-kind program to better understand and **reduce the impacts of commercial shipping on at-risk whales.**

- Implement threat reduction measures




Over 5,700 vessel transits slowed down or stayed distanced while travelling through key areas for southern resident killer whales between June and October 2022.
